HISTORY.

In the year 1793, Dr. Joseph Brown proposed to supply the City of New York with water, by bringing the river Bronx to Harlem in an open Canal, raising it to the required height by steam, and conducting it to the city in a six-inch pipe. Propositions have been made since by William Weston, and others, with reference to the same source. The CROTON was first recommended in the year 1832, by Col. Dewitt Clinton. In 1833, the legislature authorized surveys. In 1834, a permanent board of Water Commissioners was organized. In 1835, Feb. 16th, the report of Stephen Allen, Wm. W. Fox, Saul Alley, Charles Dusenbury, and Benjamin M. Brown, Water Commissioners, was made, recommending the work as constructed. Surveys by D. B. Douglass and John Martineau, in 1833 and 1834. March 4th, 1835, plan adopted by the Common Council. April 13th, the citizens decided by a distinct vote that the work should be constructed. May 7th, the Commissioners were directed to proceed.—Water introduced July 4th, 1842. THE AQUEDUCT commences at the CROTON River, five miles from the Hudson, in Westchester County. The DAM is 250 feet long, 70 wide at bottom, and 7 at top, height 40 feet, built of stone and cement. It sets the river back five miles, covering 400 acres, and holds five hundred millions of gallons. From the dam the Aqueduct proceeds, sometimes tunnelling through solid rock, crossing valleys by embankments, and brooks by culverts, until it reaches Harlem River, a distance of 33 miles. It is built of stone, brick, and cement, arched over and under, 6 feet 9 inches wide at bottom, 7 feet 5 inches at top of side walls, and 8 feet 5 inches in height. It will discharge in 24 hours, sixty millions of gallons: descent 13½ in. per mile. It will cross the Harlem River on a MAGNIFICENT BRIDGE OF STONE, 1450 feet long, with 15 arches, 8 of 80 feet span, and 7 of 50 feet span. From high tide to soffit of arch 100 feet, to top of bridge 114 feet, cost about nine hundred thousand dollars. Water is for the present conducted across in an iron pipe laid as an inverted syphon. THE MANHATTAN VALLEY, at Harlem, is passed by two inverted syphons of cast iron 3 feet in diameter, descending 105 feet below the grade line: 2½ miles from termination of Aqueduct of masonry, it passes CLENDENNING VALLEY, with arches over streets and side-walks about 40 feet high. The RECEIVING RESERVOIR is at 86th street, 38 miles from the DAM, it covers thirty-five acres, and contains 150 millions of gallons. The water is conveyed to the DISTRIBUTING RESERVOIR on Murray's Hill, 40th street, in iron pipes. It is 41 miles from the dam, covers four acres, built of stone and cement, height 43 feet above the street, resembling a spacious castle, or fort. It holds 20 millions of gallons. From this reservoir iron pipes are laid under ground through the city. Water will rise in any part 114 feet above tide, nearly as high as the clock of the City Hall. Over 110 miles of pipes are already laid. The whole cost will be about TWELVE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS.

A RATTLESNAKE FLAG IN BOSTON!

The Citizens Indignantly Tear it in Pieces!

EXCITEMENT AT THE NORTHEND

The patriotic citizens of the North End were greatly excited this morning upon receiving the information that a veritable rattlesnake flag was displayed from the mast head of the barque Manhattan, of Savannah, Ga., which had just arrived at Gray's wharf.

Several hundred people, including many adopted citizens, soon collected at that place to find the story true. A peremptory demand was made upon the Captain of the barque to lower his treasonable colors and substitute the Stars and Stripes in their stead.

This was refused with oaths and threats to shoot, but the pressure soon became so threatening that the captain was intimidated into an unwilling compliance with the demand.

This was not enough for the crowd. They demanded the custody of the treasonable bunting, which was accordingly thrown on shore. It first fell into the hands of the police, but the people must put their own hands upon it, and the result was that it was speedily torn into a thousand pieces—trophies of patriotic indignation, which were speedily distributed broadcast over the city. The flag bore 15 stars, and a serpent, with this device:

"Don't tread on us!"

Capt. Davis, of the Manhattan, states that the barque when purchased, had the flag on board which he displayed, and that it was always considered by him as a private signal.—He was not aware of the excitement caused by the attack on Fort Sumter, he would not have hoisted it. He is proud, however, to say that it is the flag except the stars, displayed by Paul Jones.



































*Piece of the Secession Flag, taken

This slave named Chadwick, a Jersey man, says he was with


Elsworth at the time he was shot.
