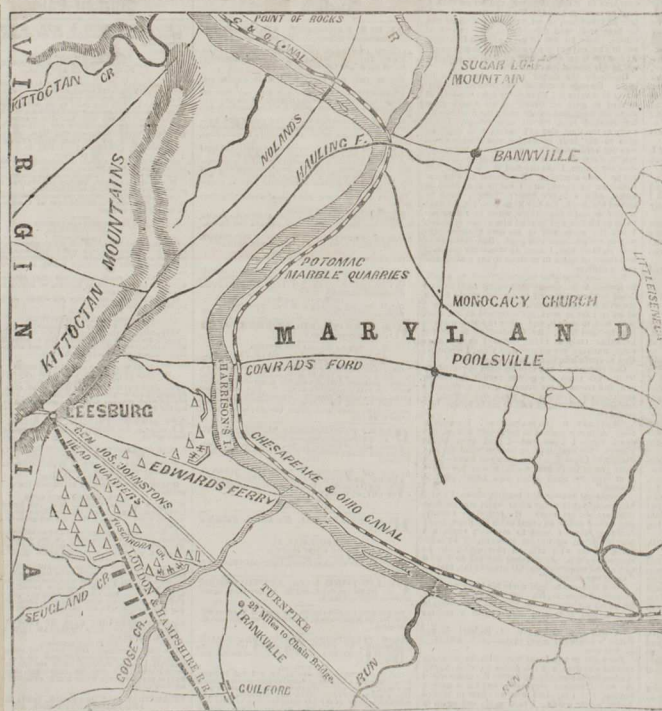
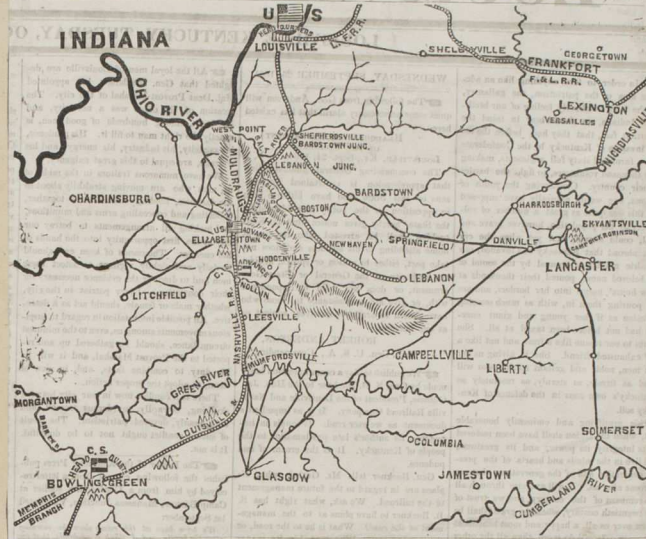


THE PRESENT CAMPAIGN.

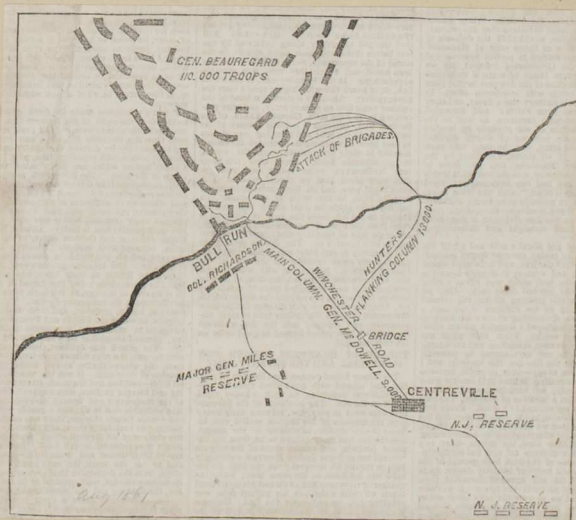


The Seat of War in Kentucky.



THE BATTLE GROUND IN THE VICINITY OF LEESBURG.

The above map will convey to the reader an accurate idea of the position of Leesburg, Harper's Ferry, and the other important localities in the vicinity. The distance from Leesburg to Washington is about five miles; from Leesburg to Frankfort the same distance; and from Leesburg to the Chain Bridge about twenty-three miles. Leesburg is the capital of Loudon county, Virginia, and is situated near a point called 'K. town.' It is distant about one hundred and fifty miles north from Richmond, and contains, beside a court house, several churches, a bank or two, an academy, and is well supplied with food and three thousand inhabitants. *Oct 1861*
