WASHINGTON ST. VOLUNTEER REFRESHMENT SALOON, PHILA.

On the breaking out of the Rebellion, and only a few days after the President's Proclamation was issued, Pennsylvania troops began to arrive in our city on their way to the Capital, and were detained for a short time at the Baltimore Depot, Broad and Prime Streets, where they were liberally entertained by the citizens in that vicinity. Soon after this, troops from other States began to arrive in rapid succession at Washington St. Wharf,-many of them suffering for want of food. The citizens who lived in the neighborhood threw open their houses to them. while others procured what they could, and entertained them on the pavements,-in this way causing a scarcity of provision, and forcing many a poor man to go to his daily work without his accustomed meal. Mr. Bazilla S. Brown, seeing the willingness of all to contribute, felt the necessity of concentrating their efforts. He received, as a donation from Savery & Co., a thirty gallon boiler, and placed it in a yard near the S. W. cor. of Washington and Swanson Sts., where he erected a rough table, from which sandwiches and coffee were served out to the soldiers. On the 27th day of May, 1861,

The Volunteer Refreshment Committee

was organized. They procured the Boat Shop, where they have since made additions for extending the tables, and ministering to the wants of the sick and wounded. Through the liberality of the citizens of Philadelphia, they have been enabled to furnish a meal to all who apply,—having at present accommodations for Four Hundred and Fifty at one time. Those in charge of the tables have become so expert, that they can clear and re-set them in ten minutes after the soldiers have finished.

We have forty basins with spigots attached, where each soldier can wash, and fill his canteen with pure Fairmount water. We also have a room and accommodations for writing, where over one hundred and fifty letters have been written and mailed during one night. By the liberality of the *Press*, we are enabled to furnish many with the latest gews, which is often eagerly read at the table before the meal.

A few days since, seven barrels of coffee, with a meal for our portion of thirty-three hundred volunteers, were given out between the hours of two and seven o'clock, A. M. This was in addition to the doings, on that morning, of the "Cooper Shop" on Otsego Street. Over Five Thousand Men have been provided with a meal in twenty-eight hours' time, at this saloon 'alone. Up to this date, (Dec. 1861,) some five hundred sick and wounded have been cared for,—many for weeks, at private houses, by ladies connected with this saloon. About one hundred and fifty thousand soldiers have been provided with a meal since the organization of the committee.

They have never asked or received any aid from City, State, or United States Government,—this institution being kept up solely by the voluntary contributions of the citizens of Philadelphia. The time and labor of the committee is all volunteered, and their duties, though arduous, have been and will be cheerfully met. The Union Soldier may be sure of receiving a hearty welcome in the "City of Erotherly Love," and a "God speed" on his way to uphold our glorious Flag—the Star Spangled Barner—

CIRCULAR.

Philadelphia, May 17th, 1865.

To the Contributors to "The Association to Procure Employment for Rebel Deserters, who have taken the Oath of Allegiance to the United States."

The capture of Richmond and the surrender of Lee within a fortnight after the organization of this Association, having happily rendered a continuance of its operations unnecessary, at a meeting of its Executive Committee on the 21st ult., a Resolution was adopted directing a settlement of the Accounts of the Treasurer—the payment of the balance in his hands to The Union Volunteer Refreshment Saloon-and a notice to the contributors, of the proceedings and dissolution of the Association.





The Union Volunteer Refreshment Committee,

ORGANIZED MAY 27, 1861,

Being the first organization of the kind in the world's history, its success was doubted by many, but perseverance and labor, sustained by a generous and loyal people surmounted the many difficulties and has enabled the Committee to give cheer and comfort to hundreds of thousands of Union Soldiers as they pass through our City to and from the seat of war. 750,000 men have been provided for gratuitously at this Saloon alone, through the liberality of the citizens of Philadelphia and surrounding country—the Committee receiving no aid from City, State, or General Government, but depending SOLELY on the Voluntary Contributions of the PEO-PLE. The time and labor of the Committee is all volunteered (with the exception of the Storekeeper.) Everything of the best quality is used upon the tables, with a strict eye to cleanliness, and for the comfort of the soldier.

The Saloon covers a lot of ground 150 feet square, with a capacity to feed from 1,200 to 1,500 soldiers at one time, and if called upon to do so, could feed 15,000 a day. We have 40 wash basins and spiggots attached, and a large bath room with a never-failing supply of Fairmount water, where many avail themselves of the luxury of a bath during the warm weather. Also, reading and writing rooms, where newspapers, stationery, etc., are found. Sleeping rooms, committee rooms, cooking apartments, provision and store rooms all under one roof.

A separate building was erected for a Hospital, to receive any passing sick or wounded soldier. This was the first one for that purpose in the country, and was established before the Government had made preparations for the sick and wounded soldiers. Since then we have erected another Hospital (18x97 feet,) and transferred the original small one to the main building, making additions as required Thousands can testify to the care and attention received there.

Among the cities of the North, there is none whose record shows, since the outbreak of the Rebellion, a nobler devotion to the cause of the Union, a more self sacrificing patriotism, a larger roll of volunteers, or more contributions of money to sustain the national honor, than that of the City of Brotherly Love. Her sons have gone into the field, not by hundreds, but by thousands. Her citizens have, from the commencement, sustained the right arm of the Govern-ment, and in every particle movement in the North, Philadelphia has nobly led the van. Before the fall of Sumter, our National Hall resounded with such acclamations as never thrilled a patriot's heart before, and the reverberations spread all over the land, with as much terror to the traitors at Montgomery, as it was inspiriting to the noble band of

spirits, who, under the gallant ANDERson, were at that time defending, in an isolated fort, the nationality of his country. All will remember the hearty endersement, which our city was the first to announce, of the heroic conduct of ANDERSON. In this, shahas of course been since seconded by the other cities of the Union. At the first call of the President, a regiment of Philadelphia volunteers, urged by a high sense of patriotism, set out to defend the capital of the country, and so urgent did they feel the necessity for promptness, that they waited neither for arms, uniforms or food. The story of their departure and sudden return, is well known-how with the Sixth Massachusetts Regiment, they were encountered by the Ballimore mob, and how, unlike them, they were obliged, because unarmed, to return again to their home. Pennsylvania and Massachusetts had thereafter a double impetus to renewed action, and the daily arrival of soldiers in Washington, prove how well both States are especially endelphia has never been the home of


