

Logan on the first day of March yearly forever, and in like manner the like proceedings shall be renewed at the expiration of every one hundred & twenty one years forever thereafter. And the said Jacob Deane hath in the body of the said Deed acknowledged in the same manner as his brother-in-law the said Jonathan Ingham hath done by an endorsement on his Deed, that he the said deceased James Logan his heirs and assigns from and after the first day of March one thousand seven hundred and fifty four shall have a full moiety or half part of all the mines of Copper or Lead ore forever as in and by the said two recited Deeds to the said Jonathan Ingham and Jacob Deane and the said endorsement, relation thereunto being respectively had may more fully appear. And whereas the said deceased James Logan by his last Will and Testament in Writing bearing date the twenty fifth day of November One thousand seven hundred and forty nine, and duly executed by him and since his death duly proved, hath in one part or clause of his said Will expressed himself thus, - "Excepting those Rents in the County of Bucks of that Tract of five hundred and ninety six Acres on which the Great Spring rises and is at present leased out to Jonas Ingham, John Ridgents and Jacob Deane the tenants thereof, that particular Tract being designed for the use of my Library, to which use I am now about granting it" And the said Testator in another clause of his said Will, wherein he devises to his son James, party hereto, certain Lots on the sixth street of Philadelphia expresses himself thus "Excepting out of the present Grant thirty five or forty feet at the most for my Library now built thereon on the sixth street aforesaid and fourscore feet in length on the same street." And the said Testator in another part of his said Will, after sundry devises to his Granddaughters, Mary Morris & Sarah Morris, Daughters of Isaac Morris and of Sarah his late wife, the deceased Daughter of the said Testator, one part of which was one thousand pounds to each concludes those devises to them with these words "is the full of their Mother's portion, But in case of either of the said Children's death, before they attain to the age of twenty one years, my Executors are to save that thousand pounds ordered herein before to be paid to her and to lay out one half of it on a purchase of some sure rents to be paid yearly by the tenants to my Librarian, one half for his own use, and the other half to purchase more Books for the Library" And the said Testator in another part of his said Will expresses himself thus, "Requesting Richard Peters who has been kind in bestowing some books on my Library which therefore bear his name, inscribed with my own, to assist in placing my books in the said Library built in Town, according to their classes as they stand in the Catalogue, but not exactly in the same order because of some difference in their sizes though of the same denomination, as Folio Quarto Octavo &c." And the said Testator in a Codicil to his said last Will bearing date the eighteenth day of January, or the eleventh month One thousand seven hundred and forty nine (fifty) and duly executed by him and proved since his death, expresses himself thus, "I give to the Trustees of my Library in the City of Philadelphia my Terrestrial and Celestial Globes, together with my Library as contained in the Catalogue of it." As by the said last Will and Codicil and proofs thereof, recorded in the Register General's Office at Philadelphia in Lib. 1. Page 510 &c. may appear. And whereas the House for the said Library was and finished in the said Testator's life at his own expence, and by his direction and order, and since his death, the shelves are put up and the Books placed

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
