

on a purchase of some rents to be paid yearly to my Librarian, one half for his own use, and the other half to purchase more books to the Librarian)

And whereas by the Testators last will it appears that he was then about making a settlement of his said Library with the fund mentioned in his said will, in the draughts of which settlement he had gone a considerable length, but while so preparing them he was seized with a paralytic disorder so that he did not complete said draft, nor execute a new settlement.

These draughts so far as completed by the Testator recite: That he had collected certain number of Greek Latin & English Books, with some in the Oriental, French & Italian mostly for his own use, through a laudable desire of promoting useful knowledge had caused a room to be built to receive said Library intended for the use of the public.

The Testator as well in consideration of the premises as of the sum of ten Shillings by said Trustees to him in hand paid did intend to grant, to them, their heirs & assigns, the lot and building in Sixth Street, with his terrestrial & celestial globes together with the library & all books that should by any means be added thereto, as also all the aforesaid yearly rents as they from time to time become due the whole at £35 Sterling.

To hold the same upon this special trust, that they will permit William Logan the Testators eldest son to finish said Library and to ceil & plaster that room at the expense of the Testator or his executors. And shall permit said William Logan to be the first Librarian to have the care and management thereof so long as he shall well behave therein. Provided always that the Librarian shall be the oldest male representative of the Testator.

If in the pursuance of these directions the office of Librarian should become the right of an infant, then the trustees are to make of some other person of the
