The first part of this tract is a translation of Gabriel Thomas' Pennsylvania, with a reproduction of his map, except that the dedication and conclusion of the original are omitted. In their stead either Falckner, the agent of the Frankfort Company, or, more probably, Pastorius, has appended explanatory foot-notes, and added a farewell paragraph. Then follows a separate title-page beginning Curieuse Nachricht, and in the succeeding pages are contained the Beantwortungen promised in the title-page of the Continuatio. The latter word seems to refer to Pastorius' Umständige Geographische Beschreibung, published in 1700, and a copy of which of the edition of 1704 is in the Loganian Library. The more important portions of Pastorius' work were translated by Mr. Lewis H. Weiss, and published in Vol. 4 of the Memoirs of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania (1850), but this Continuatio has not yet been translated into English.
