mon; I mean, that of punishing by the laws, the crimes which the laws have occasioned. If an equal punishment be ordained for two crimes that injure so-ciety in different degrees, there is nothing to deter men from committing the greater, as often as it is attended with greater advantage.

CHAP. VII.

Of estimating the Degree of Crimes.

THE foregoing reflections authorise me to affert, that crimes are only to be meafured by the injury done to society.

THEY err, therefore, who imagine that a crime is greater, or less, according to the intention of the person by whom it is committed; for this will depend on the actual impression of objects on the senses, and on the previous disposition of the mind; both which will vary in different persons, and even in the same person at different times, according to the succession of ideas, passions, and circumstances.

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
