' the worldly part in any, is the changeable ' part, and that is up and down, full and ' empty, joyful and forrowful, as things go well or ill in this world; for as the truth ' is but one, and many are made partakers of its spirit, so the world is but one, and many are made partakers of the spirit of it; and so many as do partake of it, so ' many will be straitened and perplexed with 'it: but they who are fingle to the truth, waiting daily to feel the life and virtue of it in their hearts, these shall rejoice in the ' midst of adversity,' and have to experience with the prophet, That " Although the fig-" tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit " be in the vines; the labour of the olive " shall fail, and the fields shall yield no " meat; the flock shall be cut off from the " fold, and there shall be no herd in the " stalls; yet will they rejoice in the Lord, " and joy in the God of their falvation." Hab. iii. 17, 18.

If, contrary to this, we profess the truth, and not living under the power and influence of it, are producing fruits disagreeable to the purity thereof, and trust to the strength of man to support ourselves, therein our confidence will be vain. For He, who removed the hedge from his vineyard, and gave it to be trodden under foot, by reason of the wild grapes it produced, (Isa. v. 5.) remains unchangeable: and if, for the chastisement of wickedness, and the further promoting his

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
