humbling dispensation, and I had a very lively feeling of the state of the oppressed; yet I often thought, that what I suffered was little, compared with the sufferings of the blessed Jesus, and many of his faithful sollowers; and may say with thankfulness, I

was made content.

From Saffafras we went pretty directly home, where we found our families well; and for feveral weeks after our return, I had often to look over our journey: and tho' to me it appeared as a finall fervice, and that fome faithful messengers will yet have more bitter cups to drink in those fouthern provinces for Christ's sake than we had; yet I found peace in that I had been helped to walk in sincerity, according to the understanding and strength given me.

On the thirteenth day of the eleventh month, 1766, with the unity of friends at our monthly-meeting, in company with my beloved friend Benjamin Jones, I fat out on a vifit to friends in the upper part of this province, having had drawings of love in my heart that way a confiderable time: we travelled as far as Hardwick; and I had inward peace in my labours of love amongst

them.

Thro' the humbling difpensations of Divine Providence, my mind hath been brought into a' further feeling of the difficulties of friends and their servants south-westward: and being often engaged in spirit on their
