nor Prices into a Custom, for any that hath been done heretofore, be it by Roll, or any other Precedent that may be founden.

CHAP. VI.

Oreovver, We have granted for us and our Heirs, as well to Archbishops, Bishops, Abbots, Priors, and other Folk of Holy Church, as also to Earls, Barons, and to all the Commonalty of the Land, that for no Business from henceforth, we shall take such manner of Aids, Tasks, or Prices, but by the common Assent of the Realm, and for the common Profit thereof; saving the ancient Aids and Prices due and accustomed.

CHAP. VII.

AND forfomuch as the more part of the Commonalty of the Realm find themselves fore aggrieved with the Maletot of Woolls, that is, to wit, a Toll of forty Shillings for every Sack of Wooll, and have made Petition to us for to release the same: We, at their Request, have clearly released it; and have granted for us and our Heirs, that we shall not take such things, without their common Consent and Good-will, saving to us and our Heirs the Custom of Woolls, Skins and Leather, granted before by the Commonalty aforesaid. In Witness of which things, we have caused our Letters to be Patent. Witness Edward our Son, at London, the Tenth of October, and the Twenty sisth Year of our Reign.
