

THE STRAWBERRY SEASON.—The strawberry season is nearly over. This delicious fruit has been unusually abundant this year. The farmers of Passaic and Bergen counties, N. J., have been sending from 3000 to 5000 baskets per day, to New York for the last two weeks, and the Newark Advertiser says:—"The growth of this article has given employment to many hands, the farmers paying one cent per basket for picking, and board gratis. Nimble hands can easily earn from \$1 to \$1.25 per day. An old lady, sixty-three years of age, picked one day last week, in ten hours, one hundred and seventeen baskets. Fifty strawberries were picked last week from a garden in Boundbrook, which filled a quart measure."

OUR DOMESTIC MARKETS.—The favorable state of the weather had its effect, on Saturday, in the amount of country produce brought to our markets, and the price regulating the sale of the same. There was a better supply of articles, with few exceptions, more especially butter, eggs, young vegetables, fish, &c. Beef has advanced, and choice cuts sold at 22 cents, while other articles of animal food were equally high. Poultry, like game, is becoming scarce, and commands a high figure. Oysters are plenty, and sell at reasonable rates. Lobster is more abundant, and fine—and the same may be said of frogs, and other like delicacies. Potatoes, which are abundant at the East, and held only by speculators, have fallen off in price, and must soon come down to a low standard, as the new article is now in the southern market. We are informed there will be an abundant yield of asparagus, peas, strawberries, &c., notwithstanding the late severe weather.

The steamer from Savannah arrived yesterday afternoon with a quantity of peas, strawberries, &c., on board, but the articles were of an inferior quality, selling at exorbitant rates. We give a list of prices, carefully prepared from good sources:

Household Products.—Superior poundable butter, 31½¢ 40 cents; tub and roll do, 28¢ 30 cents; eggs, fresh, 18¾¢ cents per dozen; lard, 12½¢ 14 cents per pound; cheese, 8½¢ 16 cents; hominy, 10 cents per quart; dry beans, 10½¢ 16 cents; smearcase, 3 cents per bowl, or cake; Bologna sausage, smoked, 18¢ 20 cents per pound.

Poultry.—Turkeys, geese, ducks and capons, are scarce, and owing to the late season, scarcely quotable. Capons are worth \$2.50 a \$4.50 per pair; turkeys \$1.50 a \$3 each. Chickens are selling from \$1.12½ a \$2 per pair, and squabs 35¢ 40 cts.

Game.—Out of season. Snipe sell at 50¢ 62½¢ cents per pair; frogs, 37½¢ 50 cents per dozen. Other articles not quotable.

Fish.—Fresh shad, 15¢ 25 cents each, for southern; and 25¢ 40 for Delaware; halibut, 12½¢ cents per lb.; smelts, 15 cents; flounders, 8 cents; blackfish, 6¢ 8 cents; rock, 10 cents; fresh cod, 6¼¢ cents; perch, per bunch, 12½¢ 16¾¢ cents; catfish, 6¼¢ 12½¢ cts; haddock, 5¢ 6 cts. per lb.; oysters, \$1.50 a \$3 per thousand; terrapin, \$5 a \$10 per doz. scarce; lobster, 8¢ 10 cents per lb.; clams, 25¢ 50 cents per hundred; salmon, salt, 14¢ 16 cents; mackerel, do., 8¢ 11 cents; shad, do., 12½¢ cents; hard shell crabs, 25¢ 31¼¢ cents per dozen.

Meats.—Choice cuts of beef, for roasting, 13¢ 20 cents per pound; chop house steak, 20¢ 22; sirloin do, 18¾¢; corned beef, 10¢ 12½¢; rump steak, 12½¢ 16¢; beef tongues, 70¢ 75 cents each; do kidneys, 10¢ 12½¢ cents each; do liver, 5¢ 8 cents per pound; do heart, 30¢ 40 cents each; do shio, 21½¢ 37½¢ cents; do leg, 44¢ 50 cents; sheep, by the whole, 10 cents per pound; mutton chop, 10¢ 12½¢ per pound; mutton for neck and leg, 6¢ 10 cts; young lamb, \$1.50 a \$1.75 per quarter, and scarce, or \$1.50 a \$5 each; veal, 3¢ 12½¢ cts. per pound; do outlets, 12½¢ 15 cts; pork chops, 10¢ 12½¢ cents per pound; do, for the quarter, 8¢ 11 cents; roasting pig, \$1.25 a \$1.75 each; pig's feet, per set, 10¢ 31½¢ cts; ham, sliced, 12½¢ 16 cts. per pound; sausages, 12½¢ 14 cents; tripe, 4¢ 6 cents; salt pork, 10¢ 12½¢ cents; pig's head, 6¼¢ cents; fresh; pig's jaw, 7 cents; salt; sweet breads, 6¼¢ 12½¢ cents each.

Vegetables and Fruits.—Potatoes, common, per bushel, \$1.00 a \$1.90 or 20 a 25 cents per half peck; sweet do., per bushel, \$1.25 a \$1.50, or 25¢ 30 cts. per half peck; turnips, 75¢ a \$1 per bushel, or 16¢ 18 cts. per half peck; new radishes, 4¢ 10 per bunch; onions, old, per quarter peck, 15 cts; cabbage, per head, 8¢ 10 cents; celery, per bunch, 12½¢ 18¾¢ cents; carrots, 8 cents per quarter peck; beets, 6¢ 8 cts. per bunch; Lima beans, per quart, 12¢ 14; parsnips, per quarter peck, 6¢ 8 cents; pumpkins, each, 8¢ 25; spinach, per half peck, 6 cents; pot. herbs, 2 cents per bunch; apples, 21½¢ 32½¢ cts. per half peck, or \$3 a \$4.50 per bbl.; dried apples, 7 cts. per quart; dried peaches, 12½¢ cents; cherries, 8¢ 20 cents as in quality; cranberries, 16¢ 23 cts. per quart; figs, 15¢ 18¾¢ cts. per pound; peas, 14 cents per quart; salad, new, 6¢ 10 cents per head; onions, do., 2 cents per bunch; beets, old, 1¢ 2 cents each; oyster plant, 6¼¢ cents per bunch; asparagus, new, 87½¢ a \$1 cents per bunch; rhubarb, 10¢ 25 cents; green peas, \$1.50 a \$2 per peck; green mint, 6¢ 10 cts per bunch.
