Hats that were fashioned in the days of our boyhood "suits them much," and coats with the high backed collar, and bishop sleeves, in vogue some twenty years ago, are the very acme of perfection. We have, also, the book merchants, now extending over the city, and various other kinds of street operations too numerous to mention.
