

THE GRAND BALL OF THE SONS OF MALTA-A SPLENDID AFFAIR.—The grand charity ball of the Sons of Malta took place, last night, at the Academy of Music, of Malta took place, last night, at the Academy of Music, and it was as complete a success as the most enthusiastic "Son" could have desired. The parquet was floored over, and a splendid dancing floor was thus formed. The stage was enclosed with the beautiful drapery used on the occasion of the opening Ball of the Academy two years since. The rear of the stage was arranged with scenery to represent a rich collonade, with a vista of columns running back to an apparently almost interminable distance. Immediately over the front of the stage was a collossal Maltese cross, with the word "Charity" in sparkling letters. Banners were hung around the stage and the front was graced with the American flag handsomely festooned. In addition to the magnificent crystal chandelier so well known to all who frequent the opera house, there were seven very large

The "Foyer' was fitted up as a refreshment room, and this apartment was specially decorated for the occasion. The windows were hung with handsome curtains, which were tastefully arranged so as to be in keeping with the other embellishments of the house and with the grand occasion. The Maltese cross figured conspicuously here, and garjands of flowers were appropriately placed. The decorations of the building were entrusted to Messrs. W. H. Carryl & Bro., and they were gotien up in tasteful style. There were two bands of music engaged for the Ball. They were placed upon opposite sides of the grand apartment. One, a brass band, played marches for the promenades. The performers in this band were dressed in military uniforms. The members of the string band were clad in citizens' attire. At 10 o'clock the fête was in full blast, and there were at that time some fifteen hundred people present. A large portion occupied seats in the boxes, leaving ample room upon the spacious floor for dancing and promenading. The members of the Order wore neat gold Maltese crosses on the lappels of their coats; with this exception, they wore nothing to distinguish them from the other gentlemea present.

The great feature of the Ball was the fact that many of the ladies wore calico dresses over their ordinary ball room attire, until at a given signal the calico was doffed and the fair wearres shone out in all the splendor of silks and satins. These calico robes gave a whinsical appearance to their wearers, and the gazer from the upper tiers of boxes was at a loss what to compare the motley crowd to. Report of the Board of Health for the Fis-eal Year 1858.—We have received from W. L. Bladen, Esq., Clerk of the Board, their Annual Report, from which we glean the following for the information of our readers: The number of vessels visited at the Lazaretto station during the quarantine season was

domestic ports. S7 were detained for purification and ventilation, prior to being permitted to
come up to the City; and of this number 22 were
obliged to discharge their cargoes at the station,
which were subsequently transported in lighters
to the City.

961 foreign passengers arrived in vessels, and
were treated according to law during quarantine
season, and 2222 during the whole year. The
number of vessels thus visted and treated was
much larger than have ever been detained at the
Lazaretto.

44 patients were treated at the Lazaretto hospital, of whom 39, under the successful attention
of Dr. Filbert, the Lazaretto Physician, entirely
recovered, and 5 died.

The Board regret that the proper registry of
births for 1855, '56, and '57, as required by an Act
of Assembly of March 27th, 1819, has also, for the

same reason, been neglected. This is partially occasioned by the neglect of those practising midwifery in not reporting to the officers of the Department. The present Board have taken up the subject, and expect in a few weeks to furnish to Councils and the public the requisite statement of births during the year 1858.

The Board would call the attention of Councils to the filthy ceadition of the public docks, and sewers emptying therein. From the report of our Sanitary Committee, and the experience of past years, they feel satisfied that nearly all of the sporadic cases of yellow fever reported during the Summer months originate from these sources, and they would earnestly urge their cleansing at an early period, at a time when the commerce of the port could not be interfered with, and no sickness arise therefrom.
