The Paul Family Papers (Collection 2033) at the Historical Society of Pennsylvania holds the papers of Thomas Paul, and other material about the New Jersey branch of the Paul family.

Biographical/Historical Notes

The Watson & Paul firm was the partnership formed by two brothers-in-law, James Paul (1770-1839) and John Watson (died 1811). Paul was the last of ten children born to John and Sidney

Paul, and was raised in the Indian King, a renowned inn managed by the Paul family on High (now Market) Street in Philadelphia. Three of Paul's siblings died in infancy, and two sisters and his widowed mother perished in the yellow fever epidemic of 1793. James Paul and John Watson, the husband of Paul's sister Hannah, were appointed administrators of Sidney Paul's estate; soon after, the men closed the Indian King and became partners in the commission merchant business.

Watson & Paul's first appearance in the city directories was in 1797, where they were listed as "merchants, South Wharves, south side of Chesnut St" (their warehouse at 24 South Wharves was featured on a plan facing page 37 in Abraham Ritter's 1860 volume, *Philadelphia and Her Merchants*). The Watson & Paul firm remained listed in the directories on the Chestnut Street Wharf, which they bought in 1804, or at 24 South Wharves through the death of John Watson. Little else is known about Watson except for his marriage to Hannah Paul in April 1793; an obituary in the November 28, 1811, issue of *Poulson's American Daily Advertiser* simply described him as a "former Merchant of this city" who had died in Burlington, NJ, a few days before.

James Paul had married Elizabeth Rodman (1774-1835) of Burlington in 1797, and the couple, with their twelve children, resided on North Fifth Street across from the Christ Church burial ground. Both Paul and his wife had been raised in the Society of Friends; Paul remained a Quaker until his participation in the suppression of the 1794 Whiskey Rebellion in western Pennsylvania. Upon his return to Philadelphia, he was read out of the Society, and eventually became affiliated with the First Presbyterian Church. James Paul remained in the directories as a merchant until the last decade of his life, when he appeared as a "gentleman" with a home address of 176 South Third St. The Paul family held ownership of the Chestnut Street Wharf until 1847.

A second Paul family member figuring in the Watson & Paul Business Records is James Paul's older brother, Thomas (1760-1802). Also raised in the Indian King, he had at first been in business with another brother-in-law, Cornelius Comegys (husband of Ann Paul), trading as Comegys & Paul. Later, yet another brother-in-law, Joseph Atkinson (husband of Susanna Paul), joined that firm to create Comegys, Paul, & Co. (not to be confused with Comegys Paul & Co.. – without a comma – which was the firm operated by Thomas Paul's son Comegys Paul (1785-1851)). The material in this collection deals only with Thomas Paul's later years, when he was headquartered in Belvidere, a town located in Warren County, New Jersey, along the Delaware River.

Further biographical information on the Paul family can be found in Henry Paul's genealogy, *Joseph Paull of Ilminster, Somerset, England, and Some of His Descendants who have resided in Philadelphia, Penna.* (1933).

Collection Overview

The Watson & Paul Business Records spans the period from 1792-1807 and primarily contains correspondence and financial documents relating to their trade arrangements with a variety of local and national vendors and merchants, as well as those in Europe and the West and East Indies. As Watson & Paul were involved in the carrying trade (bringing products from the East and West Indies and reselling them to Europeans), the files hold bills of lading, some landing certificates, invoices, and many prices current, in addition to the correspondence with merchants and suppliers, all of which gives a detailed view of the business of shipping at the time. The collection is divided into two series: Correspondence; and Financial Documents.

<u>Series I, Correspondence (1794-1807)</u> holds letters written to the Watson & Paul firm confirming business agreements, giving details of the goods and specifics of their transportation and value, and occasional news of the growing and harvesting conditions, states of the market, local politics, and weather.

In America, Watson & Paul dealt with merchants and farmers from New York to Charleston who supplied mostly agricultural products to the firm. Typical of the vendors was William Hartshorn Jr. of Norfolk, Virginia, from whom Watson & Paul procured 186 kegs and 14 barrels of hog's lard between March and June 1801. One local New Jersey merchant, Jonathan Hill, reveals a more typical exchange of trade in a letter from 1798: "I have sent 158 bbls By Saml Kikendall he will Expect you to pay him the Frt which I would be glad you would do if in your power – give him a back load of Plaister with one Bble Tar and half Bus. Red Clover Seed, send a bill with the prices of the articles."

The papers in this series may or may not represent the complete commercial relationship between Watson & Paul and any of the merchants found in the files. Some merchants, such as Joseph Byrnes of Charleston, are represented by just a few letters advertising their goods and services. In contrast, the New York firm of David & Philip Grim, merchants located on Old-Slip, has five folders that hold more than eighty letters demonstrating a more extensive business association. The correspondence, bills of lading, and ship invoices show the company shipping cargo pork, prime beef, whale oil, and pickled shad, among other goods, to Philadelphia, and answering Watson & Paul's request for plaster of Paris, salmon, and gin. The Grims also report on the state of the markets in New York, as well as passing on other news of interest such as a fire at a nearby bake house, and the November 1796 suicide of a fellow merchant (and Watson & Paul supplier) Robert Bruce, who hung himself in his store ("this was the end of as good a man, by reputation as any person in the City").

Among Watson & Paul's international relationships were those with merchants John Darrieux and Caleb Newbold, who shipped a dozen boxes of indigo and fifty-nine bales of fabrics on consignment from Calcutta to Philadelphia in 1806. From Canton in 1805 came chests of Hyson tea sent by Charles Ross, and by John Field, fifteen boxes each of enameled cups and saucers,

and 800 tortoise shell combs. From Buchanan & Bickham, on the Isle of France (now Mauritius), came 470 chests of tea in August 1807. In the fall of that year, Watson & Paul shipped on consignment four bales of "India goods" to Hollingsworth & Boyd in Guadeloupe, with the instructions that they should "please dispose of them to the best advantage and remit us the Proceeds in Coffee if it comports for our Interest." This transaction is recorded in a set of notarized papers, still tied through with their green silk ribbon, that includes invoices, correspondence, a bill of lading and a landing certificate, as well as the mailing wrapper in which they were transmitted. Another letter in the Hollingsworth & Boyd file, dated March 1, 1807, retains the sample of printed cotton fabric that the firm enclosed with their letter to Watson & Paul. In a few cases, particularly with the international vendors, the paperwork shows merchandise being shipped to Watson & Paul along with two other firms in Philadelphia, Levi Hollingsworth & Son, and Coates & Randolph, but Watson & Paul's relationship with those two firms is otherwise unexplored.

Less typical in the collection is a letter from Anthony Filippi of Philadelphia, who enclosed a prices current sheet and a letter of recommendation on behalf of the Italian firm I. B. Filippi & Co., of Genoa.

Not surprisingly, some of the correspondents mention their concern over the yellow fever epidemics sweeping the mid-Atlantic cities for five years during this period. Thomas Tenant wrote an account of the deaths in Baltimore in 1797, ending with the statement, "So much for the Yellow fever. We are willing to never se [sic] or hear of it again." The following year, Abraham Falconar wrote that Baltimore "never was more healthy at this season of the year, & hope the contagious Fever will escape us, with anxious desire that you & yours may escape the dreadful malady" which was then devastating Philadelphia. A July 29, 1799, letter from the Grims in New York, announced the arrival of yellow fever in that city: "tis suppose it was brought to this place by the Ship *General Wayne* from the Havana, it is traced from that ship."

Other woes concerned other writers, particularly those in Europe. Charles Vogel of Hamburg enclosed circulars, his prices current sheets, and reports of sales of merchandise including fabrics and tea sent to him by Watson & Paul, but he also included many comments about trade being hindered by the Napoleonic Wars, blockades of the Elbe, news of possible truces, and gratitude for his American contacts. In February 1807, he wrote that because of "...the interdicted trade with G. Britain and the dreadful conflagrations in the Danish West India Islands, indeed our whole dependence is confined to the Supplies we may receive from the United States."

Correspondence reveals that Watson & Paul shipped coffee, cotton, and other goods from Philadelphia to the Antwerp firm of J. Ridgway Mertens & Co. Its founder was Philadelphia merchant Jacob Ridgway, father of the Library Company of Philadelphia's great benefactor Phoebe Ridgway Rush, and a partner in the Philadelphia firm of Smith & Ridgway. Jacob Ridgway (1768-1843) had moved to Europe to protect Smith & Ridgway's shipping interests

during the Napoleonic Wars and stayed to become the United States Consul at Antwerp; during that time he formed J. Ridgway Mertens & Co. The company's folder holds a number of annotated prices current sheets, and, like Charles Vogel, letters with commentary on the state of the economy during wartime, including an acknowledgement in May 1806 that "The war with Prussia & England must however operate in favor of produce & the American Trade – as it cuts off large supplies which used to be carried in Prussian vessels from England."

The Watson & Paul Business Records reveals little of the relationship between the firm's two partners themselves, outside of two sets of letters written by James Paul to John Watson during Paul's business trips to New York in 1797 and 1799. Correspondence to the firm from Thomas Paul (addressed to "Dear Brothers") is more substantive, with fifteen letters recording Paul's regular need for financial assistance, as well as details of the merchandise in which they were trading. In February 1799, he requested his brother's help in placing an advertisement to sell "lotts suitable for a Summers retreat from Philadelphia." Elizabeth Stadleman Paul (1764 -1828), the widow of Thomas Paul (1760-1802), kept her husband's businesses going with the assistance of John Kinney Jr. One letter indicating this is found at the end of the Thomas Paul folder: writing under Elizabeth Paul's name, Kinney said that "We [changed by Kinney from "I"] send you seven Casks of flaxseed and some pig Iron" and asked in return for two boxes of 8 by 10 window glass, some black lutestring [a silk fabric], and "one piece of Handsome Swansdown [wool and silk fabric] for Waistcoating & one Journal & Ledger the size Mr. James Paul can Determin." Kinney, of Knowlton Mills, in Warren County, New Jersey, was independently sending pork, flour, lard, and ham to Watson & Paul during the same time period.

While there are many manuscript listings of current prices contained in the letters, printed prices current forms were sent to Watson & Paul by the following merchants: Joseph Byrnes (Charleston, SC, 1801); Byrnes, Cachard & Co. (Marseilles, 1806); Cachard, Belknap & Hodge (Marseilles, 1807); Daniel Crommelin & Sons (Amsterdam, 1805); Earle & Attwood (Cape Francois, Saint-Domingue, 1801); Grant Webb & Co. (Leghorn, 1806-1807); I. B. Filippi & Co. (Genoa, 1806); J. Ridgway Mertens & Co. (Antwerp, 1806-1807); James McMurtrie (Amsterdam & Isle of France, 1807); and Charles T. Vogel (Hamburg, 1806-1807), and can be found in their folders.

Series II, Financial Documents (1792-1805) holds records of moneys owed and paid by and to the Watson & Paul firm. It is arranged in four subseries: Invoices; Contract; Bank Notes; and Bills of Exchange, all of which record various financial activities of the company between 1792 and 1803. The invoices in this series were presented from suppliers not represented in the correspondence files of Series I (invoices are filed with the correspondence in that series). The merchants in Series II are Philadelphia vendors and craftspeople, or have no address listed.

The Invoices subseries is divided into seven sections: Freight, Fees, and Fines; Merchandise; Personal; Postage; Rent and Storage; Services; and Subscriptions and Advertising. The first folder holds invoices for shipping freight, and document prices paid for the movement of goods

in 1794 and 1795. Several of the invoices are from the owners of sailing vessels, while others are from local carriers; one paper notes a fee paid to the Collector of the Port of Philadelphia and another, a fine the firm received for casks "not being branded according to Law."

Invoices for Merchandise primarily document the hundreds of barrels and hogsheads of agricultural products purchased by Watson & Paul, including pork, flour, mackerel, ham, rum, and molasses. There are also many invoices for sundries such as hinges, nails, hair powder, candles, and soap. The invoices are arranged and foldered alphabetically by vendor. With one exception, the chemist and druggist John Hart who used a printed form, all invoices for merchandise are handwritten slips of paper.

Personal invoices are for items such as boots, shoes, clothing, and a desk bought at auction; this folder holds also a receipt for sets of Windsor chairs and a settee made for the Paul family in 1794 by noted furniture maker William Cox (died 1811). The Postage folder holds three small slips recording the daily totals for postage paid by the firm from February to May in 1795.

Services includes invoices from carpenters, coopers, packers, picklers, strappers, weighers, and measurers, as well as craftspeople providing paving, laundry, and various repair services to the merchants. Subscriptions and Advertising completes the Invoices subseries. It holds two printed receipts from Zachariah Poulson for his *American Daily Advertiser*, and invoices for the firm's advertising of hams, gin, and other cargo, as well as houses and lots for sale.

The single Contract in that subseries binds James Paul and Joseph Thomas in a financial arrangement with three other men; it is an incomplete document, missing the lower right corner where the names were signed.

The Bank Notes subseries holds slips of paper exchanged directly for funds drawn on the Bank of North America and the Bank of Pennsylvania. They cover the years 1794-1802, and with just a few exceptions, are printed forms filled in with manuscript inscriptions. The Bills of Exchange subseries holds manuscript notes of credit issued between two parties (which were often then circulated to other parties) and later exchanged for currency. They cover the years 1792 through 1805, but lack bills for the year 1797.
