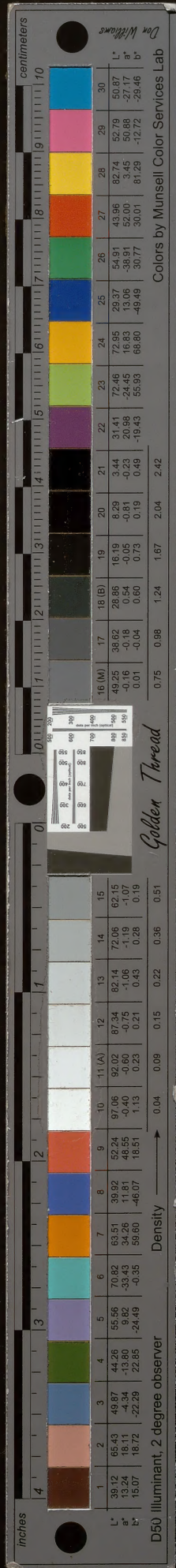
ADVERTISEMENT.
