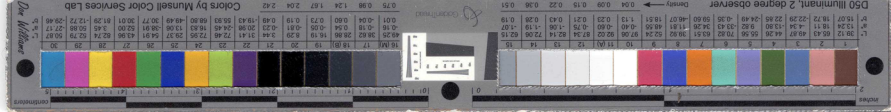

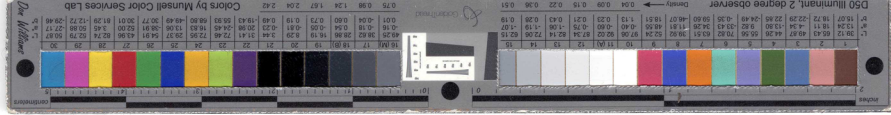

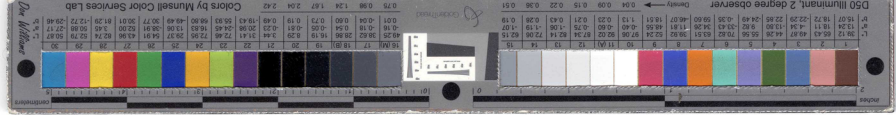

2.^d Resolved As the opinion of this meeting That the Library ought to be so kept open as soon as its funds shall be found adequate thereto

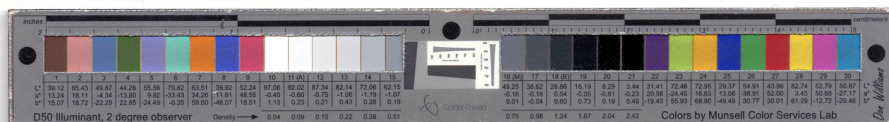

At a meeting of the members of the Library Company of Philadelphia, convened in the Library Room, on Saturday, the 27th instant, in pursuance of the request of a number of the members, and after public notice given in the newspapers of this city, in conformity to a bye-law of the 3d of May, 1742, for the purpose of taking "into consideration the propriety of having the Library open during the whole day," the following Resolutions were moved and seconded:

1st. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this meeting, That it would tend to promote the interests of Literature, as well as of this Institution, that the Library be in future kept open during the morning as well as the afternoon.

2d. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this meeting, That this Library ought to be so kept open as soon as its funds shall be found adequate thereto.

On taking the question—

Thirty-six attending members, and five absent members, represented by proxies, voted in the affirmative—and

Seventy one attending members, and two hundred and eighty absent members, represented by proxies, voted in the negative.—So the motion was lost.
