ADDITIONAL CODICIL.

Be it remembered, That I, James Rush, of the city of Philadelphia, M.D., do make this additional codicil to my last will and testament, dated the 26th day of February, A. D. (1860) eighteen hundred and sixty, in manner following—that is to say:—

First. I have given and devised the greater part of my estate to my executor for the purpose of erecting for the Library Company of Philadelphia a building not only large enough to contain their present books, but also their probable increase for many years to come. Now, as I do not desire that the Library Company shall have an income greater than is required to provide for the legitimate (not a competing) increase of the library and their current expenses (not to be so large as to invite extravagance and waste), for which purposes the sums to be set apart to secure the legacies and annuities given by my said will and testament will be sufficient, I hereby authorize and direct my said executor to expend the whole remainder of my estate in the purchase of a lot and the erection of the library building, construction of
