



Dear Sir,

The Historical Society of Pennsylvania has once more to propose an exchange with the Library Company, or rather with the Logemanian Library.

Within the last five years this Society has obtained by purchase, gift or exchange, over one hundred volumes of Colonial and revolutionary newspapers. These volumes comprise the Mercury, Gazette, Journal, and other ancient Philadelphia papers, which taken together afford an unbroken series of years from 1727 to 1785, but of no one of these papers have we a consecutive file, and we therefore turn to you, as rich in duplicates, in the hope that by offering a fair equivalent you may enable us to accommodate the many persons, who visit our Rooms to consult old newspapers, with a more complete file of our papers than we now have.

We have to offer you:

I. A copy of the Zionitischer Weyranchs-Hügel, the first book printed at Germantown, the first issue of Christopher Sower's press, and the earliest American example of printing from German type. Mr Fiske Harris, the great collector of American Poetry, recently paid Forty dollars for a copy without a title page, a fault which reduces the value of such bibliographical curiosities more than one half. As an instance of this we would mention Mr Brinley's copy of Aitkin's edition of the Bible, which lacking



the title page sold for ten dollars.

II. A complete set of Valentine's Manual (in 28 vols) the corner stone of any collection of the History of New York. Mr Brinley's series of 24 volumes brought \$36, but it lacked the four rarest, one of which has recently sold for \$30, and this set cannot therefore be worth less than one hundred dollars.

III. A series of 115 privately engraved portraits, to which is attached the late Mr Sabin's Certificate, that their market value is not less than three dollars each.

IV. And lastly we will give you in print and manuscript the Session Laws of Pennsylvania from 1730 to 1744, the only volume needed to make your set of laws complete, from 1714 to 1770. The like of which can not be found in any public institution in the country! We have no duplicates of the seven printed sessions covered by our offer, which we only obtained a few weeks ago, and are induced to part with them simply because you now have the only series of laws accessible to the public, at all approaching completeness.


In return we would ask for the Soganian duplicates of the Pennsylvanica Gazette No 1031 folio. This file of papers begins with No 40 and ends with No 164b, but lacks no less than 805 numbers, and therefore contains only 841 papers scattered over a period of over 30 years. Were they consecutive, there would be just 16 years, and an idea of their value compared with the several items which we offer can be obtained from the price realised by the only volume of the period, covered by your file, in the Brinley Collection. This was Forty eight dollars for a perfectly complete year, but as the Soganian copy does not contain one perfect year, its value must be very much less.

Trusting that after due consideration we may receive a favorable answer to what we believe is a generous offer,




Report to the Book Committee


The screen in the garden to afford the Janitor a space to dry clothes has been put up and looks well.


The doors for the book-cases in the Ladies Room have been put up & wired, thereby securing the books from being carried off and also improving the appearance of the Room.



The agent of the Central New Co applied early in October to know at what price the Lownay Co would sell the Building at the corner of 5th & Lownay Streets. I replied that some years ago the Board fixed \$100,000-- for the Lownay Building and the Law Buildings together, & I supposed that sum would still buy them: and that the Board preferred to sell both together. A few days after I happened to meet him in the street and he said that his principal had been willing to buy the Lownay Building alone for about \$40,000-- or \$50,000--, but not the two. So the matter dropped.
