Immediately after the war, when gold fell, we at once put down our prices, supposing that materials and labour would come down immediately, but in this we were disappointed, for it is only recently that the cost of materials have been reduced to what we expected.

Harris made Library bindings a specialty for over thirty years, we early came to the conclusion that the best way to retain custom was to do the work well, and not strive to turn out low-priced work. That in binding for a public library



the main consideration should be, not the first cost of the binding, but its cheapness when compared with its durability.

Having done the binding for the Philadelphia Library for a quarter of a century, we refer to the Librarian, and his assistants, as well as to those who have been in the habit of using the books bound by us, as to the three principal points in binding for a public library. We respectfully submit

1st, How many books bound by us in that period of time, have been rebound, except it was for the soiled and greasy condition of the exterior.

2nd, How many books have been returned with sheets improperly placed, or loose.

3rd, How many Engravings, Maps or Charts have been cut into, or injured in the process of binding.


We would respectfully call attention to the fact, that during the time that the Company had numbers of their books bound in England in full Calf, that we received, and secured in the covers, a very large proportion of those

full bound Calf books





Referring to the conversa-
tion which I had the pleasure
of having with you a few days
ago, I beg to say that I shall
be very glad to act as the Agent
of the Philadelphia Library Co.
for foreign books.

I beg to propose as a satis-
factory arrangement, the same,
that has been in force with the
Public Library in Boston, viz:
to receive a certain account
of books, according to the Induc-
tions given, as soon as published,
once or twice every month, in



a good $\frac{1}{2}$ Morocco binding.

These can be controlled and supplemented by the monthly bulletins, it being understood, that all books, which the Library Committee may specify as desirable, will be ordered independently from the new publications, but will not be duplicated, if they happen to be already selected.


All books are to be imported free of duties according to the list, which I had the pleasure of giving you.

If any further information should be desired, I shall be glad to give it, and if you entrust me with the legacy, you will please to let me have a power of attorney.






I think that the

The books to be selected by your agents abroad as they are published, out of the following: Science, ^{classe} History, Biography, and Fiction; ^{with} ~~and~~ miscellaneous books of general interest all ~~to be~~ such as will be ~~to be~~, suited for a public Library used by young persons of both sexes: but no book to be selected merely because it is morally unobjectionable. 

2. Special books may be ordered
from the ~~stocks~~ ^{Bulletins} at the rates above
named, but if the same books are actually in
transit, the order to be cancelled.

3. Books ordered, if in stock, can
occasionally, but not as a rule, be
sent at the above rates.

4. Powers of attorney to enter the
books at the custom house, to be
furnished you. If you will send
^{them} to us they shall be executed forthwith.




The first Com^t of Finance and Railway
Branch to whom were referred the subject
of Salines respectfully report that the
Salines as now arranged are those
set forth in the accompanying exhibit
marked A and amount to \$7484.

The increase over former rates are
as follows:

Mr. L. P. Smith from \$2400 to \$3400
Gov. Abbott " 1500 to 1800
Burg - Town " 300 to 500
Clifford Lewis (new) 1000.

making a total increase of \$1800.

In view of the cost of expenses of
the Railway Branch over its entire
during the past year and the necessity
of a rigid economy to avoid ex-
pense in the future the Com^t



feel constrained to demand a
considerable reduction upon the salaries
now allowed. It is late however
~~as~~ we propose to revert to the late
established prior to the acquisition of the
Railway Branch.

We suggest for the adop-
tion of the Board the following Schedules
hereto annexed headed B.

The changes
from present rates, stated succinctly, are:
Mr Smith's Sal^y \$3400 to \$2800
Drew's " 500 to 600
Lewis' " 1000 to 700

It will be observed that we also propose
to charge \$200 of Mr Abbott's salary to
the Logician Library.

The net result will be a surplus
to the ~~the~~ Railway Branch of \$1100
an decrease to the library funds of \$200
& an increase to the Logician " of \$200.

In other words the total annual
Reduction of Salaries will be \$1100.


The obstinate leak in the roof of the
