As a Diary exhibits to the teacher and the parent the diligence or negligence of the pupil, it therefore often incites to increased efforts on the part of the latter to gain the meritorious marks. Hence it is considered by many teachers an invaluable auxiliary in their arduous profession.
The Diary should be in the possession of the teacher during the week, and all marks should be entered by him. As the characters for any one day will be in a horizontal line, by causing the pupil to call his marks in the order in which the studies are printed, the teacher can very rapidly mark the diaries of a class of 30 or 40 pupils.
At the close of the week the Diary should be sent to the parent, who should examine the marks very carefully, inquire the cause of any appearance of negligence or deficiency, and attach his signature that the teacher may know it has been properly inspected.

FUNCTIONS—It is highly desirable that this important habit should be acquired in early life.
BEHAVIOR—These marks are given for the conduct during school hours, including the time occupied in coming to and going from school. The deportment towards teachers and associates should be particularly noted.
TIDINESS.—In marking for tidiness the teacher should be very particular; noting whether the face, hands, and teeth are clean, whether the hair is well combed and adjusted; whether the clothes are free from dust, the shoes properly brushed, and the desk and books used by the pupil are in a neat and orderly condition.
PARENTS should particularly impress upon their children the necessity of conforming in all respects to the rules and regulations of the school.
This Diary should never be rolled or folded.
