- No. 8. South view of late residence. This was known formerly as the "Old Maule Manor House," (excepting the Richards, who at one time owned this and most of the adjoining lands.) Mr. Maule was the oldest land owner in this part of Radnor. He was the succeeding purchaser to him who held it under the "Penn Patent" of two hundred years ago. The price paid by Richards was *Five shillings per acre!*
- No. 9. View of same from the North, with Garden on the left.
- No. 10. View from the S. S. W., showing Lawn, Flower Garden, etc. and Drives around the house.
- No. 11. Partial view of the old and principal Barn and Implement House. Hay Wagon, with its "rustling fragrant load."
- No. 12. South View of the Main Barn and Granary, Stables for pleasure horses, (coachman standing in front,) and Coach House—fronting directly upon the Lancaster Pike. On centre of Coach House is seen "the Farm Clock."
- No. 13. Meadow north of the Pike. View of the Henery.
- No. 14. Principal Spring and Dairy Houses, as seen from the S. W.
- No. 15. "Wayne Hall," as seen from the S. W. This building is located directly upon "The Pike," and has been erected for public uses, a Library Company, for Lectures and other secular purposes during the week, and for worship on Sundays. In the background can be seen the Rail Road, and across it, the cultivated fields.
- No. 16. Modernized dwelling, adjoining Wayne Hall, on the "Pike," formerly known as the "Old Barber Farm House."
- No. 17. Spring House, etc. belonging to the Barber Farm, located in meadow immediately south of Old Farm House.
